CALL FOR PAPERS

The 33rd Ancient Philosophy Workshop (2010) will be dedicated to the memory of STEVEN K. STRANGE. Widely respected for his learning and for his scholarship in the fields of later Platonism, Plotinus, and Neoplatonism, Steve had taught since 1990 at Emory University, where he convened the 29th Ancient Philosophy Workshop. Previously he had taught at the University of Pittsburgh and Harvard University, and as visiting professor at Princeton University and at The Ohio State University. He received his Ph.D. under auspices of the Joint Program at UT Austin in 1981, and he was student-participant at the first three Workshops in the series.

Sessions of the 33rd Workshop will begin on the evening of Thursday, March 25, 2010, and will conclude by 1:00 p.m. on Sunday, March 28.

Program not thematically restricted. Submitted proposals may be on any figure, problem, or aspect of ancient philosophy. The Workshop has a tradition of encouraging the presentation of work-in-progress by junior scholars. Accordingly, while the initial evaluation of proposals will be based on blind reviewing, in constructing the program, preference may be given, *ceteris paribus*, to junior scholars. Moreover, some consideration will be given to appropriate thematic clustering. In the spirit of the dedication to Steve Strange, it is expected that at least one Workshop session will be devoted to a topic or topics in the philosophy of late antiquity.

Respondents/commentators. There will be respondents/commentators for most of the presentations at the Workshop. Authors whose submitted proposals are not selected for presentation may be invited to serve as respondents/commentators.

Instructions for proposals. In oral presentation, each paper should not exceed 35 minutes (about 5,000 words), so as to allow adequate time for the respondent's comments and for general discussion. It will be assumed that the paper is close to its final form, within the indicated limits, when the proposal is submitted. **However, only abstracts, of about 300-500 words, should be sent** to the selection panel. These may be sent via e-mail, FAX, or postal- or courier-service (address particulars below). The author's name, institutional address, e-mail address, and telephone and FAX numbers should appear separately from the submitted abstract. **If sent via e-mail, attached abstracts and, in due course, papers should be transmitted only as PDF files.**

Deadlines. **Abstracts** must be received **no later than Friday January 8, 2010**. The selection panel will notify proposers of its selections on or about January 20. **Complete copies of the papers that have been accepted** are to be provided as soon as possible thereafter, but **in no event later than Wednesday February 10.**
